Ecclesiastes: to everything there is a season Reading Guide

Author/Illustrator: Cynthia Rylant Themes: seasons of life, difficult times, grief, transition

Lesson/Notes: This book may help children going through a difficult or painful time. It acknowledges life's seasons of difficulty with a balanced tone and uplifting illustrations. It can be a conversation starter for mindfulness, and it normalizes the variety in human experience. We all go through different seasons of life. Sometimes seasons are difficult or challenging; sometimes they are light and fun. When hard times come, we can pay attention to how we feel. We can also see if there is something to learn from a hard time and remember good times will come again. Practice being in the moment during enjoyable seasons.

Discussion Questions

- Which part of this book stands out most to you?
- Is there a "time" in the book that seems difficult? Interesting? (for younger children: Sad? Happy?)
- What kind of a "time" do you think we're in now?
- Imagine a tree in springtime. How does it change in the summer? What would it look like in autumn? How about winter?
